MESSAGE FROM DR CLAUDIA ZINI

Dear friends, colleagues, and supporters,

As I look back on 2024, I feel an overwhelming sense of gratitude and pride. This has been a year of incredible growth, new opportunities, and important international recognition for the work we have been building with passion since 2018.

One of the biggest highlights this year was Kuma International being selected as one of the 50 organizations worldwide for the **Creativity Pioneers Fund**, organized by the **Moleskine Foundation**. Out of 2,100 applications from 136 countries, Kuma was recognized for its innovative approach to exploring art, memory, and reconciliation in post-conflict contexts. At a time when the world is seeing increasing militarization and ongoing wars, our work stands as a necessary counterpoint—using the stories and experiences of those who have lived through war to critically examine its consequences.

This year, we also strengthened our collaborations, building new partnerships with leading institutions and further establishing our presence in the international arts and cultural research community. Through projects focused on **transitional justice**, **memory**, **and reconciliation**, we continue to create opportunities for artists, scholars, and young people to engage with Bosnia's complex history in meaningful ways—while also expanding the conversation to other regions facing conflict. By drawing connections between different post-war contexts, we aim to deepen the understanding of the universal challenges of remembrance, justice, and healing.

Our **educational programs** have also seen incredible growth. The **Kuma International Summer School** received a record number of applications, reinforcing its role as a key platform for arts-based learning in post-conflict societies. At the same time, our **Italian High School Cultural Exchange** continues to flourish, bringing more young people to Sarajevo and deepening their understanding of Bosnia's history and artistic landscape.

On a personal level, **2024 was a milestone year for me**. I was incredibly honored to receive the **Cavaliere dell'Ordine della Stella d'Italia**, a recognition of my commitment to cultural diplomacy in Bosnia and Herzegovina. I was also awarded the **Revizor Fellowship 2025** for my work in post-conflict artistic research and documentation.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without **our incredible team, partners, and supporters**. Kuma is not just about projects—it is about people: artists, students, and communities coming together to create, reflect, and heal through the power of art.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are preparing for another exciting year:

- Welcoming over 500 Italian students for immersive artistic and historical learning experiences in Sarajevo.
- Hosting the 8th edition of the Kuma International Summer School, marking the 30th anniversary of the Srebrenica Genocide, creating a powerful space for reflection and dialogue.
- Expanding the Kuma Residency Program, bringing more international artists and scholars to Bosnia.
- Strengthening our collaboration with RMIT University (Australia) on *The Art of Remembrance and Peace*, examining how the arts contribute to transitional justice and reconciliation.
- Launching collaborations with international professionals in the fields of arts and memory, fostering cross-border knowledge exchange.
- Taking Kuma's mission to the global stage, with our participation in Radio Elsewheres [re.03] in Canada, October 2025, as we continue to expand our work in new international contexts.

With these goals ahead, we remain deeply committed to using **art as a tool for dialogue**, **education**, **and healing**. This recognition reaffirms our mission and strengthens our ability to challenge narratives that normalize violence, while highlighting the urgent need for reflection, remembrance, and peace.

Expanding Our International Collaborations

- New partnerships with UNFPA (Bosnia and Herzegovina), Yale, and Syracuse University (United States), further strengthening our work in arts, reconciliation, and cultural diplomacy.
- **First-time collaboration** with **RMIT University (Australia)** on *The Art of Remembrance and Peace*, examining how the arts contribute to transitional justice and reconciliation.
- Continued partnership with Forum ZFD (Bosnia and Herzegovina) on *The Art of Archiving*, engaging youth in memory work and artistic storytelling in Srebrenica.



Record-Breaking Interest in the Kuma International Summer School

The **7th edition of our Summer School** welcomed **28 participants** from across Europe, Palestine, Ukraine, Georgia, and Azerbaijan, reflecting the program's growing international reach.

- **Nearly 70 applications** were received, demonstrating the increasing demand for arts-based learning in post-war societies.
- Discussions centered on art, **memory, displacement and migration**, featuring leading scholars and artists.



Supporting the Bosnian Diaspora Through Art Residencies

- Kuma's **Residency Program** continued to provide a platform for **diaspora artists and researchers** to reconnect with Bosnia, explore their heritage, and contribute to impactful artistic initiatives.
- Aida Šehović (USA/BiH) & Arna Mačkić (Netherlands/BiH) Cups of Memory, exploring how Srebrenica is remembered in Dutch public spaces.
- Lora Adžić (Australia/BiH) Investigating diaspora identity and experiences of return to Bosnia.

- Radio Elsewheres: Bridging Borders Through Sound (Sarajevo, June 2024) A 24/7
 experimental radio project amplifying global voices on migration, identity, and
 displacement.
- The Art of Archiving (*Srebrenica*, *July–August 2024*) A hands-on project engaging youth in archival research and artistic storytelling.
- The Art of Remembrance and Peace (Bosnia & Kosovo, in partnership with RMIT, ongoing) Investigating the role of arts in memory, identity, and transitional justice.

Cavaliere dell'Ordine della Stella d'Italia – A Recognition for Cultural Diplomacy


In 2024, Kuma International's Founder & Director, Claudia Zini, was awarded the prestigious Cavaliere dell'Ordine della Stella d'Italia, an honor conferred by the President of the Italian Republic upon the proposal of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation.

The **ceremony**, held at the **Residence of the Italian Ambassador in Sarajevo**, celebrated Claudia's exceptional contributions to **cultural diplomacy and reconciliation efforts** in Bosnia and Herzegovina.



"This important recognition certainly does not come by chance. Our cultural diplomacy can boast a remarkable 'unifying power' in a society such as Bosnia and Herzegovina, still divided by persistent ethnic-religious fault lines. Italian culture can therefore put itself at the service of reconciliation and social cohesion processes, looking especially at the youngest, who are essential to the country's European path. An inspiring criterion that is fully in line with Claudia's commitment—the commitment of a lifetime, we can certainly say."

This recognition highlights the profound impact of Kuma International's mission to use art and culture as tools for healing, dialogue, and understanding in post-conflict societies. It underscores Claudia's unwavering dedication to fostering connections across divides and inspiring positive change through creativity and education.

Creativity Pioneers Fund – A Testament to Kuma's Global Impact

In 2024, Kuma International was honored to be selected as **one of only 50 organizations** from **over 2,100 applications across 136 countries** to receive support from the **Creativity Pioneers Fund**, organized by the **Moleskine Foundation**.

The Creativity Pioneers Fund, launched in 2021, recognizes cultural and creative organizations worldwide that address pressing challenges through innovative and unconventional solutions.

This year's **cohort** includes remarkable organizations from **Rwanda to Norway, South Africa to Argentina**, each using creativity and culture to **make a lasting impact in their communities**.



We are profoundly grateful to the **Moleskine Foundation** for this honor and excited to **embark** on this transformative chapter.




Major Awards & Recognitions

Sarajevo Film Festival – Showcasing Migration & Music Through Film

In **August 2024**, Kuma International proudly celebrated the debut of our documentary film **Travelers (Putnici)** in the **BH Film category** at the **30th Sarajevo Film Festiva**l.

The **screening, held on August 18th at Cineplexx 3**, marked a significant milestone in our mission to **bridge divides and foster understanding through art and storytelling**.


Directed by Mirza Ajnadžić, *Travelers* was created as part of Music in My Suitcase—a project by Kuma International and CRS that connects people on the move with the local community through music, showing its power as a universal language of empathy and unity.





Travelers captures the **personal stories** of individuals navigating **migration and displacement**, emphasizing **resilience** and the **shared humanity** of those often marginalized.

By spotlighting these experiences, the film underscores the **importance of fostering dialogue** and understanding in an increasingly divided world.





BalkanEros Band i Putnici 2. septembar 2023. u 20h, Atelje Figure
















The 7th edition of the Kuma International Summer School marked a significant milestone as we successfully hosted this program for the seventh consecutive year. Supported by **Erasmus Plus, Kreisau-Initiative, and Općina Centar Sarajevo**, the school explored themes of memory, identity, migration, and reconciliation, fostering meaningful cross-cultural discussions among students and experts.





Program Highlights:

- **Day 1:** A sound walk through Sarajevo and Trebević Mountain set the stage for discussions on identity, belonging, and Bosnia's layered history.
- **Day 2:** Conversations centered around home, migration, and the evolving sense of identity in post-conflict societies.
- **Day 3:** Participants engaged with Sarajevo's history through guided visits to monuments and museums.
- **Day 4:** Guest speakers examined how memory, cultural narratives, and artistic practices shape the understanding of Bosnia's past.
- **Day 5:** The final day in Sarajevo included discussions on genocide, literature, and visual arts, ending with a musical moment connecting Bosnian melodies to migration stories.

Key Components:

- Sarajevo Lectures & Conversations: 15 lectures and discussions on art, migration, identity, war, and displacement.
- Field Trip to Goražde: A guided hike along wartime escape routes, followed by a roundtable discussion on war legacies and resilience in post-war communities.











Italian High School Student Visits




Throughout 2024, Kuma International welcomed more than 150 Italian high school students to Sarajevo. These visits provided immersive educational experiences on **memory, genocide, migration, and music**, connecting students with artists, historians, and cultural experts. Through interactive workshops, historical site visits, and artistic reflections, students gained a deeper understanding of Bosnia's history and the role of memory in post conflict societies.






In February 2024, Kuma International partnered with **Syracuse School of Architecture and Yale University** to host an **Educational Week in Sarajevo**, bringing eleven architecture students for a five-day immersive experience. The program, "A Seed for a Song: Urban Seed Libraries as Memory Vessels", was led by **Visiting Fellow Christina Zhang** in collaboration with **Smirna Kulenović and Kuma International**, exploring the intersection of **memory, urban landscapes, and ecological storytelling.**











The program invited students to reflect on architecture's role in shaping spaces of resilience and renewal in post-traumatic cities. Through workshops, site visits, and design exercises, participants critically examined how built environments can foster healing and community connection.



Kuma International played a key role in designing and coordinating the program, selecting guest speakers, managing logistics, and curating meaningful experiences for participants. This first-time collaboration reinforced Kuma's commitment to **education**, **dialogue**, **and healing through creative and interdisciplinary practices**.













Kuma International was honored to be an implementing partner in this **youth exchange project**, organized by **UNFPA with support from the Italian Embassy in Bosnia and Herzegovina**. The initiative brought together 40 young participants to explore **art, history, identity, and reconciliation** through workshops, cultural visits, and creative collaborations. Kuma played a central role in **program design, coordination of guest speakers, and studio visits,** ensuring a rich and immersive experience.

Program Phases:

- Sarajevo (November 17–23): Participants engaged in photography workshops, teambuilding activities, and visits to cultural landmarks such as the War Childhood Museum
- Udine (November 23–29): In Italy, they explored cultural heritage and sustainability through art exhibitions, historical tours, and creative discussions, deepening their appreciation of shared histories and diverse perspectives.









Key Activities & Collaborations

- Photography Workshops: Participants developed skills in visual storytelling, capturing themes of social cohesion and identity.
- Art and Memory Sessions: Interactive discussions explored how art preserves memory, promotes healing, and engages with history.
- Cultural Visits: Participants visited significant sites such as the War Childhood Museum in Sarajevo, the Ossuary Temple in Udine, and art exhibitions featuring Bosnian and Italian artists.
















How can radio transcend borders and connect voices from around the world? In June 2024, **Radio Elsewheres [re.02]** responded to this question through its second iteration, transmitting from Sarajevo alongside Velibor Božović's exhibition *Unfolding Elsewheres* at **Manifesto Gallery for Contemporary Arts.**

Conceived and curated by **Velibor Božović**, **Steve Bates**, **Claudia Zini**, **and Adna Muslija**, the radio station operated from Kuma International's studio while broadcasting online **24/7 from June 7 to June 28**, **2024**. **Radio Elsewheres (RE)** is a hybrid online and terrestrial radio art project that explores **movement**, **displacement**, **and transformation** through sound-based research, storytelling, and artistic interventions. By creating a sonic space where sound art and social engagement converge, RE challenges notions of borders, migration, and belonging, while expanding the possibilities of listening to and from 'elsewheres.'

Key Highlights:

- **Broadcasting 24/7**: Featured live and pre-recorded contributions from Bosnia and Herzegovina, Ukraine, and beyond. A major highlight was a **24-hour program dedicated to Palestine** and a **live recording from Sarajevo's 5th Pride March**.
- **Live Events**: Two events in collaboration with Manifesto Gallery engaged audiences in discussions about sound, identity, and displacement.





How can historical archives become living tools for dialogue and reconciliation?


The Art of Archiving explored this question through a **multidisciplinary project** that highlighted the role of the **Documentation Center in Srebrenica** in preserving history and fostering conversations about the past.

- Initial Visit to Srebrenica (July 30 August 3, 2024): The project team—Ibro Hasanović,
 Vladimir Miladinović, and Claudia Zini—visited the Documentation Center to explore its archives and connect with its team.
- Workshop During the International Week of Srebrenica (August 2024): A two-day workshop engaged 20 young participants from Srebrenica and surrounding areas.
 - **Ibro Hasanović** guided participants in creating short films inspired by archival photographs, using their phones as creative tools.
 - **Vladimir Miladinović** introduced drawing techniques on archival images, encouraging personal and emotional engagement with history.
 - The workshop concluded with an **exhibition and discussion**, showcasing participants' artworks and films.
- **Development of an Educational Module:** Following the workshop, the team developed a **practical educational module** integrating **archival research**, **storytelling**, **and art**, designed to inspire future projects.



This project demonstrated how collaboration between artists from different backgrounds, like Hasanović (from Srebrenica) and Miladinović (from Belgrade), can foster shared understanding of history. The Documentation Center's strong community ties were crucial in creating an engaging and trustful space for young participants.










Supported by: Forum ZFD in collaboration with **Adopt Srebrenica**, *The Art of Archiving* successfully empowered youth, underscored the **value of archives**, and created lasting tools for future artistic and educational initiatives.



In 2024, Kuma International established a groundbreaking collaboration with **RMIT University** (Melbourne, Australia), laying the foundation for **The Art of Remembrance and Peace: Transitional Justice and Reconciliation in Post-Conflict Societies**, a project set for **implementation in 2025**.

This interdisciplinary initiative will explore how **arts and creative practices** contribute to **reconciliation, transitional justice, and healing** in post-conflict communities, with a focus on **Bosnia and Herzegovina and Kosovo**. It will also address the ethical complexities of using art as a tool for **remembrance and peacebuilding** in contexts.

We are especially proud of **Adela Kusur's journey**, as she first joined Kuma International as a **resident in 2023**. Her continued research in this field exemplifies Kuma's **long-term impact** in fostering young scholars and artists. By integrating **fieldwork**, **ethnography**, **and creative practices**, this collaboration will offer new insights into **reconciliation**, **transitional justice**, **and artistic expression**.

This marks an important step forward for Kuma International, **further establishing its role** as a platform for dialogue and **pioneering research in post-conflict societies**.



Kuma International's **Residency Program** remains a **vital platform** for artists and scholars to **explore memory, migration, and reconciliation.** In 2024, we hosted three residencies that embodied our **mission to foster creativity, dialogue, and healing**. These residencies not only advanced the work of participating artists but also enriched Kuma's **growing network**, reinforcing our commitment to **supporting artistic practices that engage with complex histories.**

Camilla de Maffei & Christian Elia

Dates: February 2024 **Location:** Sarajevo

This residency focused on memory, migration, and identity in Bosnia, documenting wartorn landscapes and remnants of memory in abandoned buildings. Using photography, oral history, and text, the project explored themes of rural depopulation and the cultural heritage of displaced communities.



Aida Šehović & Arna Mačkić

Dates: October 2024 **Location:** Sarajevo

Artists Aida Šehović and Arna Mačkić collaborated on Cups of Memory, a research project aimed at decolonizing the public memory of the Srebrenica Genocide within Dutch history and public spaces. Their work critically examines how collective remembrance is shaped, highlighting the absence of Srebrenica in mainstream European narratives, and proposing new ways to integrate this history into public consciousness.



Lora Adžić

Dates: September - November 2024

Location: Sarajevo

Adžić, an artist from Melbourne with Bosnian roots, joined Kuma International for a two-month residency. Her time at Kuma was dedicated to exploring diaspora experiences and reconnecting with her heritage, making this residency deeply personal and meaningful. Her work centered on the former-Yugoslav diaspora experience, combining research, creative exploration, and study trips to Mostar and Banja Luka. This residency highlighted the importance of creating spaces for diaspora artists to reconnect with their cultural roots and family histories.
